My beloved, the flock of our Lord Jesus Christ in the Diocese of Sydney.

Today, being Palm Sunday, is the 7th Sunday in our journey towards our destination which is Easter, "The feast of feasts". And the gospel reading of today tells us about the glorious entry of Jesus into Jerusalem.

We are told that when the people heard that Jesus was coming to Jerusalem, they were all very excited, and they were keen to give Him a good welcome. What this means for us is that, we too, when we hear news of our Lord and His kingdom approaching, should awaken ourselves to prepare for such a glorious meeting. We must prepare as Israel prepared for her God, as mentioned in Amos: "Prepare to meet your God O Israel!" (4:12), and also prepare, like the wise virgins who went out to meet their bridegroom.

But we are told as well: that the people, "took branches of palm trees and went out to meet Him, and cried out: 'Hosanna! Blessed is He who comes in the name of the Lord! The King of In addition, the carrying of palm Israel!"

Let us consider the way in which they welcomed and met the Lord:

This great crowd or multitude, in some way reminds us of the glorious multitude which St John saw in the Revelation. He writes: "And behold, a great multitude...standing before the throne and before the Lamb, clothed with white robes, with palm branches in their hands, and crying out with a loud voice saying, 'Salvation belongs to our



Gospel Reading: John 12:12-19.

God who sits on the throne and The Multitude greet the Lord to the Lamb!" (7:9-10).

In the vision of the Revelation which St John saw, we see that the multitude held palm branches, just like the multitude that came to meet Jesus that day.

But why palms? The palm tree has always been considered a sign of victory and triumph. (For example, in ancient Rome, if there was a person who conquered many times, they would refer to him as 'a man of many palms').



In the same way, our Lord Jesus Christ through His coming death, will conquer all the powers of the enemy, and therefore it was appropriate that the people surround Him with the palm branches of victory.

branches was a sign of rejoicing. and in the books of Leviticus (23:40) and Nehemiah (8:15), we are told that palms were used during the Feast of Tabernacles, . 1st that His kingdom might live through, and reflect on His which was one of the most important annual Jewish feasts.

The fact that the crowd used palm branches as an expression of joy in welcoming the Lord, symbolises that all the feasts had their fulfilment and accomplishment in the event which took place in Jerusalem on Palm Sunday.

In the Revelation, the multitude cried out saying, "Salvation to our God", and these words are an expression of what the crowd **The Lord's entrance:** in Jerusalem said: "Hosanna! Blessed is He who comes in the name of the Lord! The King of Israel!" So the words that the people used on the day when Jesus entered Jerusalem, shows that they were well aware of the scriptures, and how rightly they applied it to the Messiah.

The words of greeting which they said to the Lord are significant for many reasons:

- They greeted Him as the crown (Rev 6:2). "King of Israel", and one "who comes in the name of the Lord", and this means that:
- They Lord to be the King of Israel. Even though He went about in poverty, and even though the scribes rejected Him, the crowd still recognised Him to be a king. So as a King who has dignity and honour, we must adore Him; and as a King who has dominion and power, we must submit to Testament. Him.
- The people recognised Him to be the rightful king who was sent and who comes in the name of the Lord, not as a prophet, but as a King.
- The people recognised Him as being the promised and long expected king. He is the Messiah and King of Israel.
- In crying 'Hosanna' they prayed for 3 things:
- conquer and be victorious over all opposition, as mentioned in Revelation: "... and He went out conquering and to conquer" (6:2)
- 3rd that His kingdom will continue forever.

In the same way that these people gave a great welcome to

the Lord, we should also warmly welcome our beloved Lord into our hearts, through praising Him and pleasing Him.

Although our beloved Lord is the King of kings, and was recognised by the people as a King, He came on a simple colt. He came in humility to show that His kingdom is not of this world, and therefore the exterior appearance of greatness was not necessary. We see the Lord here in a humble state, but in His exalted state, St John sees Him in the Revelation riding on a white horse, with a bow and a

The disciples did not understand that when they went to get the colt, they were preparing for the ceremony to appoint Zion's king. But then, when Jesus was glorified, and the Spirit was poured out, they remembered that these things were written of Him in the Old

> We are told that when the Lord was glorified, the disciples, "remembered that these things were written of Him" by the prophets. These few words reveal 2 important points:

- that there is a beautiful harmony between the word and the works of God
- if we remember what is written, then it will help us to understand what is written.

We pray the LORD to make us sufferings during the coming 2nd that His kingdom might Holy Week and bless us all with sharing in the joys of HIS Resurrection.

THE POSITION OF THE RESURRECTION IN OUR LIVES

Christ rose from the dead in the body in which He was born, crucified, and died. Thus when He went to heaven following the resurrection, His disciples were troubled because they thought He was a spirit, as did the Emmaus disciples: "Concerning Jesus of Nazareth, who was a prophet mighty in deed and word before God and all the people, and how our chief priests and rulers delivered him up to be condemned to death, and crucified him. But we hoped that he was the one to redeem Israel. Yes, and besides all this, it is now the third day since this happened" (Lk 24:19-21).

"On the evening of that day, the first day of the week, the doors being shut where the disciples were, for fear of the Jews, Jesus came and stood among them and said to them, "Peace be with you." But they were frightened, and supposed that He was a ghost. And he said to them, "Why are you troubled, and why do questionings rise in your hearts? See my hands and my feet, that it is I myself; handle me, and see; for a spirit has not flesh and bones as you see that I have." And while they still did not believe because of joy and amazement, he said to them, "Have you anything here to eat?" (Jn 20:19; Lk 24:36-41)

It would have been possible here for Christ to open their eyes and reveal Himself, for them to recognize Him and believe in Him at the same time. But Christ's desire was for them to become eyewitnesses. They were able to deliver the message with the assurance of what they had seen with their eyes, so that we could accept the account given in the Word and consequently believe that which they had seen and verified.

The Apostles' belief in Christ was not just based on sight and touch, they were also given two other factors that raised their faith to the level of revelation and fellowship in the Divine truth:



spiritual fellowship described by St John in his First Epistle: "Our fellowship is with the Father and with his Son Jesus Christ" (1 Jn 1:4).

Christ gave to them at all three levels, not only to be living in them, but that they might also pass it on to us as they had received it themselves, with the same power, and freely without cost: "While we were yet sinners Christ died for us" (Rom 5:8).

John St Apostle writes:

The first factor is a higher level than believing through sight and touch. Christ: "opened their minds to understand the scriptures" (Lk 24:45), which means to know their truth. Of course this was built on the foundation of believing through seeing.

The Second factor elevated them to an even higher degree than the opening of their minds. They received the Holy Spirit through the breath of Jesus mouth, and again through the outpouring of the Holy Spirit on the day of Pentecost. Their faith reached the level of Divine truth in this way, and they became partners in it. This great gift was of course founded on their first belief, which came as a result of seeing with their physical eyes.

When the disciples handed Faith in Christ down to us, they did it at three levels: the level of sight and touch, then at the level of mind opening and the revelation of Divine truth in the living Word, and then at the level of the Holy Spirit who gives us fellowship in the Divine Truth. This is the

"That which was from the beginning, which have we heard, which we have seen with our eyes, which we have looked upon and touched with our hands, concerning the word of life, the life was made manifest, and we saw it, and testify to it, and proclaim to you the eternal life which was with the Father and was made manifest to us, that which we have seen and heard we proclaim also to you, so that you may have fellowship with us; and our fellowship is with the Father and with his Son Jesus Christ. And we are writing this that our joy may be complete" (1 Jn 1:1-4).

resurrection. I tell you that this fellowship to which St John calls us, with the apostles, the Father, and His Son Jesus Christ, that 6:6). "Let no sin therefore reign completes our joy, is the very same fellowship experienced by the apostles on the day that the resurrected Lord was revealed to them, and they "did not believe it because of joy and amazement" (Lk 24:36-41). This is the same resurrection, and is the same as that which St Peter calls our new

birth:

"Blessed be the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ! By his great mercy we have been born anew to a living hope through the resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead, and to an inheritance which is imperishable, undefiled, and unfading, kept in heaven for you" (1 Pet 1:3-4).

St Peter also offers us a transfer from the re-birth through the resurrection on the personal level to a re-birth. This takes place through the Word, "God's living word," because considered it autonomous, alive with the power of eternal life, able to give life to whoever lives by it: "You have been born anew, not of perishable seed but of imperishable, through the living and abiding word of God" (1 Pet the 1:23).

> It is amazing that St Peter and St John both considered the living word to be "the seed of God". It was the seed of eternal life if it inhabited the heart, due to its ability to offer eternal life. It offers the resurrection, in its divine nature that does not sin and cannot sin: "No one born of God commits sin; for God's nature abides in him, and he cannot sin because he is born of God" (1 Jn 3:9).

For that reason he who is born of God lives in the resurrection in that he has overcome sin and death. Paul the Apostle therefore says to those who sin after having received the life of the resurrection: "We know that Today is the day of the our old self was crucified with him so that the sinful body might be destroyed, and we might no longer be enslaved to sin" (Rom in your mortal bodies, to make you obey their passions" (Rom 6:12).

> It is as if the man who obeys sin is trying to make sin once more take a hold of his body that was crucified with Christ.

HOW TO BENEFIT SPIRITUALLY IN THE HOLY PASCHA WEEK

Pascha.

1. Our Behavior Inside and **Outside of Church**

It is very noticeable that many people during Pascha Week are one thing inside church and completely different outside. In side church, black curtains, hymns, somber solemn readings, and concentrating on the suffering of Christ. Outside of church, we often laugh, joke around, socialize, think and talk about many worldly issues. We lose all the spiritual depth that we gained inside church. Let us concentrate our thoughts, conversations, and meditations around the events of this holy week and the Passion of our Savior.

2. Retreat

During our regular fasting days, we pt the words of the bible before us, "Consecrate a fast, call a sacred assembly." (Joel 1:14). How much more then should we apply this commandment during Holy Week? This week should be characterized by solitude and retreat with God, by staying away from idle discussions and various means of entertainment of pleasure. Reserve your time to God and to spiritual activities worthy of this week.

In the first hour of the Monday of the Holy Pascha, we read St. Shenouda's homily, which warns us: "Brethren if we want o escape God's punishment and find mercy in His eyes, let us sit every evening alone by ourselves and search our souls..."

3. Follow the Steps of **Christ**

Meditate on the events of the week one by one: from Palm Sunday, when Christ refused His worldly kingdom and the Jews gave up their hope in Him, until they crucified and buried Him. On Palm Sunday, ask yourself, "Is Christ King and Lord over everything in my life? Do I, like Christ, turn down worldly glory for spiritual and eternal glory? During the General Funeral Service, do I consider myself attending my own funeral?"

And when the church denounces

Judas' traitorous kiss on the eve body. But in order to succeed meditating, resting. of the Wednesday of Pascha Week, ask yourself in prayer, "How often, O Lord have I betrayed You? How many times have I told You words of love in prayers, while my actions show the opposite and my heart is far away from You?"

4. Share in the Fellowship of His Suffering



Saint Paul said, "That I may know Him and the power of His resurrection, and the fellowship of His suffering, being conformed to His death." (Philippians 3:10) Can we give ourselves an exercise this week to share in the fellowship of His suffering and be conformed to His death? Can we follow Him in His suffering and ascend with Him to the Cross? Can we say with St. Paul, "With Christ I have been crucified; it is no longer I who live, but Christ who lives in me." ? (Galatians 2:20).

Therefore, in order for Christ to live in us, we have to carry our cross and follow Him. If you have a cross in your life, do not complaint about it. Instead, rejoice in it and bear it for Christ's sake. "for to you has been granted on behalf of Christ, not only to believe in Him but to suffer for His sake." (Philippians

5. Asceticism

Whoever puts the suffering of Christ before him will not take any pleasure in eating and drinking or pampering the

prayers, fasts, and vigils so that we may be able to anoint our lintels with precious blood and escape the destroyer." And again, the blessed saint says, "Let us thus engage in the holy fasts, as having been prescribed by Him, and by means of which we find the way to God."

6. Spiritual Readings

Spiritual readings are also food for the soul. The church has organized for us a treasure of appropriate readings for every day of the Holy Week, comprised of Gospel readings, Old Testament prophesies that correspond to the events of each day, spiritual explanations and sermons of the Church Fathers. On Bright Saturday (Apocalypse night) the church reads the entire Book of Revelation.

7. Hymns

The hymns of the Pascha Week are moving and full of spiritual depth. Hymns, like reading, preserve the thought from wandering and guide it in spiritual direction. We should continue to recite the hymns while walking,

8. Prayer

Since the prayers of the Agpeya are not used during Holy Week, we are to substitute personal prayers in their place, in addition to the intensive prayers of the church, asking the Lord who bore the sins of the world and died for us, to forgive and have mercy upon us according to His great mercy.

9. Confession and Communion

During this week, each person must sit with himself and remember his sins and put them on Christ's shoulders and tell Him in shame, "Carry O Lord my sins too, with the sins of the rest of humanity. Take my sins and nail them to the Cross with You, so that Your Blood may wipe them awav!"

Look carefully at your sins and know that they are the cause of His crucifixion. Many people cry out of their sorrow for Christ's suffering while they crucify Him every day with their sins. We should not feel sorry for Christ during this week, but should be sorry for our sins that caused Him these pains. As Jesus told the women that were crying over Him, "Daughters of Jerusalem, do not cry for Me, but cry for yourselves and your children." (Luke 23:28).

Before the Cross, we stand as sinners, all under the condemnation. "no one is righteous, not even one." (Psalm 14:3). We confess our sins and prepare ourselves for communion. There are three liturgies during Holy Week: on Passover Thursday, Holy Saturday, and Easter Sunday (Preceded, of course, by the Liturgy of Palm Sunday).

10. Spiritual Storage


Pascha Week is not an opportunity to benefit for a week only, but a time to store up spiritual nourishment enough to last the whole year, particularly needed during the 50 days after the Resurrection when there is no fasting.



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
